### Curricular Aspects

#### Curricular Planning and Implementation -:

Of course we abide given framework of the university but take little liberty for more effective implementation. In 2020 Dr. Pradip Barad submitted proposal to ICSSR, New Delhi for major research project.

There are **139** research papers published in UGC Care list, Scopus and referred Journals. **12** research papers have published in Proceeding; **24** Books, including Marathi, English, Hindi, German, French, Swedish, Korean, Russian etc.and the chapters in Books are also published.

### **Extension Activities**

NSS and NCC units are working for all round development of students and special efforts are made for physical, mental and emotional growth of students. surveys are conducted and street plays are inacted to understand the problems of rural life and society. Through this solutions to social problems are suggested.

Other amenities include a cultural and seminar hall, reading room with ramp for Divangjan, meeting hall, principal office, administrative office, exam room, record room, girls' common room, separate rooms for NCC, NSS, Sport departments equipped with internet facility and big stage for the multipurpose use.

## **IT Facility**

Internet and wifi facility is available in all the departments. The available bandwidth in the institution with 03 separate connections of 50 mbps each. Two ICT rooms are available, with internet facility, with updated computer lab.

## **Library as a Learning Resource**

The central library possesses 27,086 books with reputed journals and periodicals, SOUL 2.0 software developed by INFLIBNET, More than 6700 e-journals have been made available through N-LIST. Library possesses 336 sqm. carpet area with separate reading room for girl students. 92 encyclopedia and rare books are available in library.

## **Sport Facility**

College has rich tradition of ranking in sports. The college has useful playground to serve the needs of students. A well-equipped gymnasium is available for the students.

Students are motivated to participate in various cultural activities. The college level cultural activities are organized in the auditorium. For the annual gathering open theatre is used to organize the cultural programs. In 2016-17 college hosted the **University Youth Festival**.

- Water conservation : Our Institute has taken initiative to conserve water by making various rain water harvesting pits and the rain water is collected from college building roof in the water harvesting pit.

##### **Curricular Planning and Implementation -:**

Since 'Vidya Param Daivatam' is the motto of our college, we take it as a pious duty to enrich students in all the spheres of life. University provides framework for the syllabus implementation. Of course we abide given framework of the university but take little liberty for more effective implementation. At the beginning of every year we prepare annual plan of teaching and also of various program complementary to the syllabus. Ours is an undergraduate college where two streams Arts and Commerce are run. Every year we prepare and maintain teaching diary. In diary teachers make a plan of the year, half year, month, week and also day.

##### **Internal Continuous Assessment -**

Every year we conduct continuous internal assessment through various following ways.

##### **1) Unit Test -**

Every year two unit test of all subjects are conducted. Time table of the test is displayed well in advance and students are informed. Like university, annual examination complete procedure is followed. After examination results are discussed with the students in the class and if any grievance regarding marks take place examination committee satisfy the students with appropriate proof. Even then if he / she is not satisfied he / she is sent to the principal for final decision.

##### **2) Feedback -**

Our institute gives more focus on students feedback. All the teachers take special care to organise feedback of students by allowing them to teach in the class on all units. We are happy to know that students response to this activity is positive. It helps them build courage and learning capacity.

##### **3) Seminars and Group Discussion -**

**Response:**

For the enrichment of curriculum designed by the University College takes every care to implement it more effectively with addition of its own.

**1) Professional Ethics**

Anuradha Solanki college student who has selected for international fencing competition was given help to purchase fencing kit. Like such activities take place.

**2) Gender Sensitization**

It is the fact that parents of the town and nearby villages feel very safe for their daughters to send in our college as a student. We care girls students more while making annual plan of various programs. Girls are insisted to take part in NCC, NSS, Sports, Red Ribbon Club, Environment and nature club etc. Apart from above activities college organise women empowerment workshop, 8 march women's day, aids awareness, hygienic awareness, cyber security, HB test etc. For this we invite well known doctors, lawyers, trainers and other resource persons of their respective field.

**3) Human values**

As a part of social sciences we try to keep students close to realistic situations. In 2018-19 when some villages in Kolhapur district were terribly affected with flood NSS department had organised huge rally in town for their help and donated good amount. At the time of Corona people from other states were in great trouble. We through NSS helped them by supplying rice bags, sugar and sanitizers. We also gave psychological counselling to the corona affected people and their family for mental relief.

**4) Environment and sustainability**

We try to keep College campus eco friendly by disallowing plastic bags and promote the use of old saree bags. Every year we run campaign against use of plastic and distribute handmade old saree bags. College has already made rain water harvesting in college and make its awareness among the students and staff. College makes use of solar energy and LED lights. Many of the staff members have solar panel at their home. From 2001 to 2016 all the step members followed Wednesday as a no petrol day to keep campus pollution free. We arrange environmental tour of BA part 2 and B.com part 2 years students every year at different places.

We try to avoid floral bouquet for felicitation and offer plants many a times. Students help to develop plant nursery and then the same plants we distribute among the students to plant in college or at home. We through NSS and nature club make plantation in adopted village every year.

In this way, we took care to bring our students closer to natural sources, calamities, equal and humanistic approach so as to stick up to the university expectations.

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

### 2.3.1

**Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process**

**Response:**

So far as the use of technology in teaching learning process to keep students at the centre we ever try to keep pace with the time. We focus on extension and participatory learning of students. Even before pandemic situation our teachers made use of ICT in teaching. Some of the methods we use are as follows..

**1) Internship program :**

Every year we take Commerce students to banks for experiential learning where they are given hands on training of all bank activities like filling house passing checks, RTGS, DD, online transfer etc. We have made MOU with the cooperative banks such as the Chikhli Urban cooperative Bank, The Ambika Urban cooperative Bank etc.

**2) Industrial visit :**

We have very limited pace of industry in our town but to have practical knowledge of industry working every year we arrange industrial tour to different industry.

**A) 2018-19**

In the year of 2018-19 we had taken the students of Commerce faculty to Ellora ford and Kavita enterprises, Aurangabad where nut bolt productions take place.

**B) 2019-20**

In the year of 2019-20 in Involute Gear limited company Pune , where gears of various vehicles are produced.

**C) 2022-23**

In the year of 2022-23 Trigya udyog MIDC Chikhli and Parth udyog group MIDC Chikhali where plastic bags for grocery packing and textile industry visited.

This activity of industry visit taken place every year but 2020-21 and 2021- 22 proved exception.

**3) Students Seminars and Workshop:**

All the teachers organize seminars on the taught syllabus to take feedback of their understanding. They participated in seminars enthusiastically and make use of modern technology like PPT, YouTube, Google etc.

For state level workshop every year we get good response. They are given chance for PPT presentation. As a result our students of college get exposure to new ideas of technology.

**4) Projects and Field Trips:**

For the more effective and efficient use of ICT in learning we carry average one or two projects every

year and this practice Proved to be very successful. While preparing project reports students make use of recent technology for example environmental study tour , survey on impact of GST on marginalised farmers in Chikhli Tehsil , impact of demonetisation in business in Chikhli tehsil , survey on women's participation in Panchayat Raj , survey on historical temple in chikhali taluka etc.

### 5) Online Assignments:

Adverse situation of Covid 19 where existing set of teaching learning was disturbed. Offline classes and evaluation was badly affected but our teachers took it an opportunity to cope with it. We invited trained teachers to train our teachers with essential update. Teachers adopted it for online teaching just like Zoom, Google meet, Google classroom, YouTube, Test Moz etc. For the feedback and evaluation, we assigned students online assignments. Students also responded positively. It was very quick and accurate for its analysis. The best thing of ICT is that it can remain permanently with us transparently.

In this way, for the enhancing learning experiences by using ICT tools we try to provide all kinds of learning like experiential , participative and problem solving methods.

At least 15 days before the internal examination time table is displayed on the notice board and students are informed in the classes through written notice. All the teachers prepare internal examination question papers and submit to the department of examination to keep it fully confidential. Examinations are conducted seriously like a University examinations. The evaluation of internal examination is done by all subject teachers respectively in due time. Answer sheets are given back to the students to view its evaluation and given instructions to avoid mistakes in future.

The feedback and opinions of the students on evaluation is taken orally.

Internal evaluation is generally done offline, but sometimes due to adverse situation like Covid-19 it is conducted online also. For the same Google classroom and such other ways are applied. Before Covid-19 we used to conduct two unit tests and one prelim examination but after Covid-19, we conduct two unit test only. First unit test is conducted in odd semester and second in even semester. We strictly follow the paper pattern of the university so as to bring students close to their final examination.

We have established examination mechanism to keep assessment transparent. If any grievances related to examination takes place from Student side we give due weightage. Concern teachers and the department of examination does every possible way to satisfy them. The grievance is resolved effectively and in time bound way. Even then if any student is not satisfy with the clarification of the teacher he is allowed to meet principal or head of the department. And principal or concern authority demands clarification of the same from the concern teacher in time bound way. Since our college unit is small near about all the issues or grievances regarding internal evaluation are settle down orally.

#### **GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL CELL :**

In our college we have established grievance redressal cell which looks after all kinds of grievances in the college. Especially where students feel unfair with their results or any other issue about evaluation and do not wish to disclose their names they dodge complaint in box. Committee takes every care to satisfy them with appropriate action occasionally if matter goes beyond, principal as a final authority takes final decision.

#### **EXTERNAL ASSESSMENT:**

As per University semester pattern 80% of its evaluation is done by the University and only 20% internal evaluation by college. We encourage students to score more marks. College give more than 30000 rupees scholarships and prizes to the meritorious students in all subjects. The department of Economics give 80 Plus award and like wise. These inspiration scholarships and prizes are given on independence day 15th August and Republic day 26 January every year.

In this way, we have all developed internal evaluation mechanism to keep transparency in assessment. Of course more weightage in internal marks is given to those who score more marks in unit test and regular attendance in the classes.

Library has 02 computers, a laserjet printer, and 01 barcode scanner for in house operations. All the sections of library are under CCTV surveillance.

### Policy for Divyangjan : -

Ever since the establishment of the college, it has been insisted that classrooms and library study room should be on the ground floor. Ramp has been arranged for the direct access to the Divyangjan to the working places, like issue return counter, office etc. in the library.

### A) Integrated Library Management System:-

The college library has started computerized services since 2010-11, Using SOUL 2.0 Software developed by INFLIBNET, Gandhinagar. 78 bookcases are available in the library, it is determined of using the "Geographic Information System Use in Libraries" system, Since the data entry is done on the computer, immediately after the registration of the newly arrived book in the library, the exchange does not start unless it is computerized. Since last 14 years, computerized issue-return is continuing till the date. Due to the implementation of SOUL 2.0, library management system in the district, the newly added colleges, and colleges desiring to have a computerized library, are continuously in contact with Dr.Pradip Himmatrao Barad, Librarian through telephone.

### B) Subscription to E-Resources:\_

The college library has taken up e-library consortia NLIST created by University Grants Commission's Information Library Network, Gandhinagar to provide electronic and digital library services to students, and faculty. More than 6700 e-journals have been made available through this consortia. Every year Librarian organizes workshop on " Effective use of e-resources" and about the use of e-books, the students are informed about the use of e-library, Search Sindhu, National Library of India, NDLI etc.

The college also has 37 computers that are regularly updated to align with current best standards and to accommodate the evolving needs of faculty and students. These computers are also equipped with licensed copies of software and antivirus protection to ensure their security and reliability.

Faculty of the college use LCD projectors and variety of softwares such a Power-Point, video lectures, Google Meet, Zoom and You Tube For online lectures. This allows them to make use of the latest technology to deliver their lectures and make the learning experience interactive and engaging for students. The college also has two (02) lecture halls with LCD facilities, scanners, printers in the administration section and all departments make it easy for students and faculty to access the available resources. The college has a local area network (LAN) in the office, library and Computer laboratory.

The computers are regularly updated, antivirus protection and biometric machines are used for recording attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff. It ensures the security and reliability of the systems and

makes it easy to keep track of attendance. The college website is regularly updated by a website committee. The college has set up Wi-Fi facilities and CCTV surveillance system in the campus to maintain discipline and ensure the safety and security of students and faculty.

Additionally, the college has 01 computer lab., with 27 computers and separate internet connection with of 50 mbps bandwidth. Three internet connections in the college (50 mbps each) ensure that students have access to the necessary resources to complete their coursework and research. The college also uses Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University's Secured Remote Paper Delivery (SRPD) System for examination which ensures transparency and speed in the examination process.

## Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

#### 6.1.1

*The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.*

#### Response:

Our college is run by Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Chikhli and the management body. The management is keen on providing quality education and equal opportunities. The Key decisions are taken by our governing body. We also have College Development Council (CDC) to take decisions on certain issues. The above two councils always guide the Principal and IQAC for college development and to implement future strategies by giving them freedom. The above councils completely run as per UGC Regulations and Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016, prepared by state government. The Management plays an important role in decision-making process. While taking such decisions, management discusses with teaching, non-teaching staff and former students of the college. Following is the mechanism for ensuring this:-

- 1.Governing Body: The Governing Body of the institution takes policy decision.
- 2.CDC: Members from the teaching, non-teaching staff and students are represented on the CDC.
- 3.The Principal : The Principal is the executive head of the institution. He is authorized to take decisions regarding financial matters, appointments, punitive actions, admissions etc. in accordance with the policy matters decided by the GB and the CDC.
4. IQAC: Due representation is given to faculty members, nonteaching staff members, students and external experts.
5. Heads of the departments : Heads of the various teaching departments look after the regular teaching and research in their departments and address various issues of the students, faculty and staff.

The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution. Our college has been established in rural background with a view to promote qualitative education amongst the rural students with equal opportunities and for the same, we :-

1. Make contact with the parents for making them aware about quality education during pre and post admission process.
2. Provide equal opportunities for all, mostly the students from backward classes are promoted and encouraged.
3. For providing quality education with equal opportunities, various programs are organized like-

students' workshop on research paper presentation. In tune with our mission to pursue academic excellence, we have continued to:

1. Create suitable environment for value education.
2. Promote ICT based teaching-learning process to tackle the new and advanced challenges.
3. Take care of the holistic development of the students through various activities that promote scientific temper, value education, health awareness, birth and death anniversaries of great persons, book talks etc. For this, our faculty and staff members as well as our students participate regularly through forums like IQAC, NCC, NSS, Women's Empowerment Cell, teaching departments and Yashwantrao Chavan Open University Study Center.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

### 6.2.1

*The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc*

#### Response:

The institutional Strategic/ perspective plan is effectively deployed.

Through discussions in the years 2016-17, 2017-18 Perspective Plan was finalized. It got reflected in annual plans prepared by IQAC.

1. The Governing Body is the apex body in the organizational structure. The Governing Body decides policy matters and takes key decisions including the confirmation of the services of the employees.
2. The College Development Council is established as per the Maharashtra Universities Act, 2016. It

looks after the routine affairs of the college and works for the overall development of the college on a more frequent basis than the Governing Body.

3.The IQAC works for the promotion of quality culture in the institution and monitors teaching-learning and evaluation processes. It also works for research promotion and a better student support. It coordinates various stakeholders viz the management, the principal, the staff and the students.

4.The Principal is the executive head of the institution and is responsible for the daily administration. He monitors the routine functioning of the college. Being a small unit of 14 teachers and nearly 300 students on the compact campus, the Principal is the key person of our institution. He is assisted in this by the IQAC, the heads of various departments and other committees.

5.To ensure further decentralization, a College Development Committee has been constituted in accordance with the Maharashtra Universities Act, 2016 in which, representatives from the management, society, teachers, non-teaching staff and students are included.

#### **The administrative academic and research working is done as follows:-**

**Admission of Students:-** The action plan of admission for the session is decided and meetings are arranged with the villagers. The counseling sessions are organized with respect to higher education. The rules of affiliated university are observed.

**Human Resource Management:-** The institution manages its work with the available human resources; many committees are formed for streamlining this human resource. The help from the stakeholders and alumni is taken.

**Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure/ Instrumentation:-** Books and ICT equipments are purchased as per need. Infrastructural up gradation is done as per necessity.

**Research and Development:-** Workshops and seminars are organized to inculcate the research zeal among students.

**Examination and Evaluation:-** Two unit-tests and prelim exams are conducted for the evaluation and the record is kept.

**Teaching and Learning:-** Faculty members make use of ICT, in the form of Google meet, Zoom, Google Classroom and the like devices - Youtube & Whatsapp for teaching and learning process.

**Curriculum Development:-** The institution has little scope for curriculum development. Dr.P.H.Barad (Library Sci.) Dr.B.S.Ingle (Business Economics) are members of Board of Studies. They contribute in their capacity in curriculum development. As many as 10 (ten) surveys have been done by students under the guidance of teachers. In the year 2021-22, two surveys were undertaken by Dr.S.G.Raut (Dept. of English) entitled 'E-survey of English Language' and Dr.A.S.Purohit (Dept. of Commerce) survey entitled 'A Study on Social and Economic Condition of Auto Riksha Drivers of Chikhli Precinct'.

1. SPM College Employees’ Credit Co-Operative Society is run by the members of teaching and non-teaching staff. It is a registered credit society which gives need based, low interest rate and easy flexible terms, since 1973.The college administration and management of the institution support it.
2. Financial help to the families of staff-members in case of the untimely demise of a staff member is done through fundraising. This scheme covers temporary teachers and also non-teaching staff members. Till now, it is done in informal manner, but we intend to formalize the system.
- 3.Easy short term and long term loans as well as group insurance for the teaching and non-teaching staff members through the college employees credit co-operative society, are available.
- 4.Fee Waiver Free ship for the children of non-teaching staff members, is available.

Some important measures have been developed by the institution and they are progressive. Time to time review is done and due changes are done by the administration. Following facilities are provided by the institution to the employees for career advancement:-

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1

**Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)**

#### Response:

The Institution focuses on providing best possible resources to faculty and students to achieve the mission and vision of the college by ensuring that the funds mobilized from various sources are judiciously utilized for the growth and development of the institution.

#### Sources of funds are as follows:

- 1. Salary Grant:** Office of Joint Director (Higher Education) disburses salary grant which is credited to the bank account of the employees, through college account.
- 2. UGC Grants:** College being recognized under 2f and 12B of UGC Act, receives UGC grants for development and maintenance of infrastructure as well as research.
- 3. Funds from Students' Fees:** College collects fees from students on account of admissions, examinations, etc. as per parent university rules. Fees collected for grants-in-aid courses are credited into government treasury.

4. **NSS and NCC Grant:** The college receives funds from central/state government for NCC and NSS units. The deficit arising on account of delay or less payment in fund disbursement from the concerned authorities is borne by the college.
5. **Funds from Management:** Major part of research and the amount spent on publicity are met from management funds. The management also provides financial support for arranging talks of experts and other co-curricular activities.
6. **Funds from Rent:** The college mobilizes funds from renting out its space for canteen. The rent received is credited to the management/ college account. The fund generated is utilized for payment of water, electricity bills of canteen and improvement and maintenance of canteen.
7. **Funds from Alumni:** The college receives funds from alumni for development/maintenance of infrastructure.
8. **Funds through Gym:** The college provides its gym facility for neighboring community members at a reasonable rate or on membership-basis.
9. **Faculty Contribution:** Faculty members contribute to a fund for providing financial assistance to students and for other activities.

College prepares budget of estimated income and expenditure in the beginning of academic year. After approval by management, college carries out various expenditures by following standard procedure.

Institution conducts internal audit from the Chartered Accountant and external audit from the government regularly. Mechanisms for internal Audit and External Audit are as follows:-

#### **Internal Audit:**

The institution is run on a grant-in-aid basis. Therefore, regular internal financial audit is conducted or completed by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the college management, every financial year. The chartered accountant audits the documents for all transactions. It is an audit of the balance sheet, general fund, income and expenditure, and receipt and payment account.

External financial audit is conducted in accordance with standards prescribed by UGC, state government and University. The Institution takes appropriate steps to update and complete financial audits by Government appointed auditor.

Audited Account Statements of the funds received from University under the Student Welfare Schemes and for organizing seminars are re-audited by the University.
